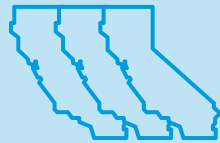

UC and climate research

The University of California Office of the President allocated \$83.1 million in state funds to 38 teams to conduct two-year climate resilience projects. Partnerships funded by these projects span 51 of CA's 58 counties. \$9.2 million of the grants were distributed directly to community, non-profit and tribal partners.

Many of California's leading industries grew from UC research, including biotechnology, computing, semiconductors, telecommunications and agriculture.

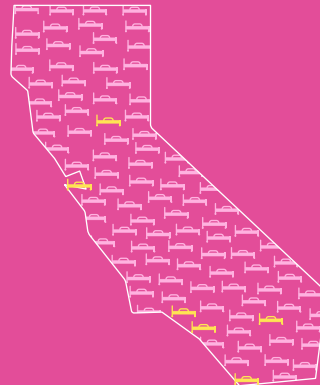


Providing health care at UC
